





Break time

There are 2 types of nouns in English:

countable
uncountable

an/one apple, **two** apples, **three** apples, **lots of** apples.

Countable nouns can be singular or plural because you can count them

rice, bread, pasta, milk.

NOT ~~a/one rice, three pastas, six milks~~

Uncountable nouns cannot be singular or plural because you cannot count them. don't use *a* or *an* with them.

We don't have **time** to cook at home. (time = we measure on a clock)


uncountable

I've cooked **three times** this week. (time = the occasions sth happens)

countable

Some nouns can be countable or uncountable, but the meaning changes.

		Countable	Uncountable
+	I'd like	a vegetable. some vegetables.	some yoghurt.
-	I don't want	an orange. any oranges.	any pasta.
?	Do you have	an apple? any apples?	any milk?



In + and - , questions. use *a, an* with singular countable nouns

some In + sentences, with uncountable and plural countable nouns

any In - sentences, questions with plural countable, uncountable nouns

1. Would you like **some cake**?

uncountable

2. Please, can I have **some more water**?

countable

4. Could you give me **some eggs**, please?

when make an offer or ask for sth: often use *some* with countable and uncountable nouns

A. I'm having **tea**. Would you like **tea** or **coffee**?

B. I'll have **a coffee**, please.

C. Me too, and **a water**.

A. OK, so **two coffees**, **a water** and **a tea** for me.

Drinks and liquids are usually uncountable: *I'd like some tea.*
But often say *a tea, a coffee*, as a quick way of speaking.
